

Updates from Session

On May 10, the Session gathered on Mother's Day evening for their monthly meeting. Your leadership made 5 decisions, which will have an immediate bearing on ministry. They are:

1. Two Called Meetings on Sunday, May 24, at both the ARISE and traditional worship services. The purpose of these meetings will be the election of a 2018 Nominating Committee reflecting the diversity of the congregation. The two ruling elders chairing the Committee will be Jim Bowen and Rick Parler. It is required that no less than three members be elected to complete the Committee with the pastor serving ex officio and without vote. As a member you are asked to prayerfully consider who might best serve and ask them as to their willingness to serve in this capacity.

2. The Session expressed gratitude to the Finance Ministry Team, Renita Fowler, Maureen Hunter, D. J. Saleeby and Pat Banks for their diligence in completing an audit of the church financial records. The recommendations made were received and appreciation was expressed.

3. A request was made from the Mission Ministry Team to hire a summer intern who would help Chris Lee manage the growing summer work camp CONNECT ministry. Between June 8 and August 7 there will be 8 camps on the Avondale grounds serving the larger Charlotte community. This summer intern would be accountable to Rev. Lee and would help with the education, enlistment and coordination of work camp opportunities with church members. Payment of the position would come from the income generated from the work camp CONNECT program.

4. Christian Nurture received the support to enrich the Small Group Ministry that currently exists at Avondale. The

purpose is to build on existing small groups and to embrace a more comprehensive ap-

proach to Small Group Ministry. This will be done by expanding and deepening our current small group ministry and offering a variety of groups: study, social, service, support and discipleship.

5. Lastly, the church leadership reviewed the goals of the church staff, as presented by our Personnel Ministry Team. Staff reviews for Parish Associate, Associate Pastor, Director of Music/Organist, ARISE Music Coordinator have been completed and 2015 goals have been reviewed and adopted by leadership. The work of the Personnel Ministry Team continues through the course of the year with review, accountability and thanksgiving for the staff and their leadership.

At the end of the long evening, the leadership expressed thanks to all who served on the audit team, to Will Vick and members of the Communications Ministry Team for their education of leaders, to Cindy McKenzie and other members for their work with the Sedgefield Middle School staff appreciation luncheon, to those who worked with the Worship Workshop, those who continue to serve on the Small Group Task Force, and to those who serve on the Personnel Ministry Team.

Celebrating “Difference Makers”

Flo Bowen – All Aboard

Why would Flo Bowen make the effort to bequest a portion of her estate to the ***Always Avondale Endowment***? There is no better person to ask than her son, Jim Bowen. So we did, and here is what he had to say:

“My Mom, Flo Bowen, died three years ago this March. As executor of her estate I learned that she left a portion of her estate and a portion of her life insurance benefit to the church. It was news to me then that the church was a beneficiary, as she wasn’t much for discussing end-of-life issues, but it didn’t surprise me that she had done so. I can explain in two ways: 1) Flo joins the bell choir, and 2) I know you; you’re Flo’s son.

- 1. Flo joins the bell choir - Mom was one of the least likely choir members, but she joined, had fun, and did what she could to contribute. Nerve damage from surgery and radiation treatments in the 80’s made her left arm unusable. She was blessed with little sense of rhythm and couldn’t read music. Learning a musical instrument as a kid was a luxury not possible growing up poor on the farm in Ohio. Did that stop her? No it didn’t. As a musician, she didn’t have much, but she gave what she could, with a smile, or a funny little “whoops” when she made a mistake.*
- 2. I know you; you’re Flo’s son – Many times I heard that phrase in the years after Mom moved to Charlotte from Bremerton, Washington. Here it was warmer, sunnier, and closer to the four of us, where she felt needed. Around Charlotte she drove her grandsons in the cute little Gramacab; at Avondale she told funny, outrageous stories about her four rowdy sons. She joined the circles, the Aitken class, the 4th Thursdays, was a ruling Elder, and attended many a women’s retreat. She could barely swim (ask Nadja), but she dove in nonetheless.*

Avondale was Mom’s home and her family, so it didn’t surprise me that her will stipulated the four sons would share the estate with Avondale. She was born poor and didn’t die rich, but thought she could help, and felt the Spirit’s call to share some of what she had.”

The Session decided to use Flo’s gift to fund the purchase of Avondale’s Church bus which is used weekly to further Avondale’s mission. The bus is used to transport Avondale members for service and recreation efforts and our homeless friends to the Church for Room In The Inn. Prior to acquiring the bus Avondale was spending significant resources to rent vehicles.

Flo’s gift to the Endowment helped Avondale buy a bus that she will never ride; however, her faith and service continues to be present whenever anyone boards the bus. Please contact Fred Wilkerson fwilkerson@att.net if you would like to discuss how to include Avondale in your estate.

Part of my “motive” is that I selfishly want to revel in their joy for life and God, and bring that back to my family and church family. I want a taste of life fully dependent on God, without distraction, and to know that I am living out my faith in genuine action. A change of scenery allows us to open our hearts and be fully present enough to do that. I am thankful that Avondale has given me opportunities to serve out my faith in action.

Betty Chambers – I cannot tell you yet why I am going to Haiti. Certainly I have empathy and compassion for a people who struggle so hard to survive. I can only tell you that God has called my name and said “You are going to Haiti, now”. And so I will leave my comfort zone, and get off the couch and go!
